News From the food Pantry

Community Donations: The Irving Park Community Food Pantry received a number of major contributions in recent weeks, including:

 followed a program in January
 and February that generated a
 donation of \$420.



GREEN KNOWLEDGE

Some Simple Steps for Keeping the Earth Clean

We all want the Earth to be green and clean. Here are a few very simple tips to help accomplish that:

- Don't let your car idle. Idling wastes fuel and pumps pollutants into the air.
- Turn the water off when you're brushing your teeth. That will save at least four gallons of water per brushing.
- Try to take all the items you need out of the refrigerator at one time, and put all items away at the same time. Continually opening and closing the door raises your electricity usage as the refrigerator kicks in each time the door is opened to maintain the interior temperature.
- Keep your alley trash bins closed tightly. Rats are a big problem in our area. If you need a new black trash bin to replace a damaged one, call

311 to request a replacement.

- Start a compost bin for food leftovers, vegetable peels, egg shells, and that dab of pasta that no one ate—even toss in shredded paper. (However, fat, bones, or meat don't go in.) The worms will just magically appear and break down it all down into beautiful compost for your garden.
- Set up a separate trash can in your kitchen to recycle the newspaper, junk mail, cereal boxes, paper egg cartons, cans, and milk and juice jugs. Then it's just an easy trip to the put it all in the blue recycling can. It's easy to remember not to put plastic bags in the blue bin; if the collectors see plastic bags, they don't collect.
- Run your yard sprinklers early in the morning or late in the afternoon. Less water will be lost to evaporation from the sun.
- Put down your electronic device and look up at the sky, the trees, and birds. Scan the ground for butterflies and flowers. That email or Twitter feed can wait.

CIVIC IMPROVEMENT

Planning Update for Independence Branch Library

In May the community was invited to a presentation about the latest plans for the new Independence Branch Library on Elston Avenue north of Irving Park. GIPNA board members Alison Benjamin and Sharon Sears are liaisons to the Steering Committee and reported on the issues and concerns discussed and clarified at the meeting.

Basic Building Details: A sixstory structure with four floors of residential housing over a two-story library. The residential component will consist of 44 affordable housing units for seniors (ages 62 and older): 36 one-bedroom and eight twobedroom units.

Residential Housing Features: The building will feature an onsite management office, fitness room, two small meeting rooms, balconies, and outdoor roof deck garden.

Library Details: The 16,000-square foot facility will offer a young children's area, teen area, and adult area, all designed with flexible seating and computer access. Space will be designated for art exhibits and for display of art salvaged from the old library. A large community room will be available for community events and library functions, and sometimes shared with the residential community for their events. The outdoor landscaped garden will be available for supervised library activities.

Parking: There will be 33 covered parking spots accessed off the alley. Some spots will be designated for library use; others will be designed for the residents. The exact number and configuration of parking spots hasn't been finalized.

Building Entrance: The library and housing units will share a large covered entrance off Elston Avenue. Residents will use a secure door; library patrons will use the adjacent entrance. The entrance also includes space for strollers and bike racks.

Project Development and Financing: This is a joint project between the Chicago Public Library and the Chicago Housing Authority. The funding is essentially all federal, consisting of HUD dollars and tax credits for the developer. Because of that, the project must meet federal guidelines for fair housing, subsidized housing, and tax credits. The makeup and size of the building are binding for 15 years and renewable for another 15 years.

Developer and Building Management: Evergreen Real Estate Services, 566 W. Lake Street, Chicago, IL 60661. The firm manages 58 properties in nine states in the Midwest, a total of 6,500 units. Evergreen will develop, manage, and rent the units. Rents will be income-based. Income levels must be between \$27,650 and \$37,920. Rents are estimated to be between \$570 and \$894 per month.

Evergreen will do extensive advertising for applicants around four months before construction is complete. Outreach through local community organizations and aldermanic offices is planned. All applicants will submit to extensive background checks.

All residents must be at least 62 years old, and all residents in each unit must be on that unit's lease. Evergreen and CHA will perform inspections on the units several times a year to verify occupants and the condition of the units. At the meeting, officials said all

applications for this development will be site-based, meaning people must apply for this development specifically. The intent appears to be that applicants will not come from the central CHA waiting list, but this final direction was not definitively stated. We'll report on this as it becomes clear.

Transportation Concerns: People raised questions about transit issues at the meeting, including bus and bike access, parking spaces, parking meters, crossing safety for pedestrians, deliveries, taxi pickups for residents, and traffic backups on Elston. These are all good questions that may require further meetings as the design and site planning process progresses.

Next Steps: The project continues in design development and will go before the Zoning and Plan Commission in early fall. Construction is expected to start in November or December of 2017, with construction completed no later than the end of 2018.

Every Cabin Needs a Good Porch

The Cabin at Old Irving has been a popular spot since it opened a few years ago at 4104 N. Pulaski, but owners Harry and Maria Nyholm and Sherrill Bodine aren't resting on their laurels. They're expanding next door to develop the Cabin's Picnic Basket, an old-fashioned sandwich and pastry shop.

"We love this neighborhood and wanted to create a unique spot for the entire family," they say. Harry says he designed the space to evoke a relaxing time on your favorite front porch in the country, including handcarved tables from Scott Rabb of Paradox Studios in Trenton, Tenn. Rabb is the son of Carol Tornow, who once operated D&H Bar in the Cabin's present location.

The menu will offer Eli's pastries and cheesecakes, old-fashioned deli sandwiches made with Manny's corn beef, other high-quality meats and cheeses, homemade salads, an artisan cheese plate with fruit and nuts, and pizza. And the Cabin staff plans is to expand the menu over time.

whippersnappers.)


