The actions we take now and the concern we show for one another will be more proof that Independence Park is a great community.



GREEN KNOWLEDGE

Vinegar + Baking Soda= Cheap Cleaner

You can do a lot of cleaning without resorting to harsh industrial chemicals. For example, who knew that white vinegar is such a good cleaning product?

A 1-to-1 solution of distilled white vinegar and water, mixed and put in a spray bottle, will let you clean your kitchen cabinets in no time. Want a sparkly washing machine? To sanitize the drum, pour in a quart of white vinegar with a cup of baking soda, and scrub with a nylon brush, then run a heavy-duty cycle at the hottest setting. Use a toothbrush and vinegar to scrub detergent compartments, or put them in the dishwasher if they're removable. Use hot, soapy water to deslime the door gasket.

Your dryer also may need a bit of work. Clean the lint trap with a crevice vacuum attachment and then wipe down the drum with that 1-to-1 solution of diluted white vinegar and water. Check the exhaust for lint buildup. Unplug



the machine and remove the duct at the back of the dryer, then use a rotary brush to pull out the lint and debris, and vacuum up any remaining fibers. Be sure to also clean the exterior vent, too.

Other simple and inexpensive products are cleaning powerhouses, too.

Bathrooms are never fun to clean, right? No problem. Use a squeeze of lemon juice to dissolve mineral deposits on faucets.

- Shower doors looking cloudy?
 Spray on undiluted white vinegar and follow with a sponge dampened with water and a few drops of dish soap.
- Is the shower head not working as well as it used to? Fill a plastic bag with white vinegar and secure it to the showerhead with a rubber band so the head is submerged

overnight. Remove and flush with hot water. It might need a bit of work with a toothpick or old toothbrush to remove those last bits of scale.

- You know that black slime that lives and builds up in the sink drain? Sprinkle in four tablespoons of baking soda and follow with two cups of white vinegar.
 Once the bubbling stops, flush with boiling water.
- Use full-strength vinegar to brighten up dingy grout. Pour the vinegar directly on the grout lines and use a stiff grout brush to scrub with a mix of baking soda, water, and a few drops of dish detergent. Let it sit for five minutes and then brush again.
 Wipe up with a damp sponge and rinse. Follow up with a good grout sealer.

Have to have a clean refrigerator, right? Wipe down the inside, door, and gasket with hot, soapy water mixed with a tablespoon of baking soda. To keep the baskets from sticking and ripping prematurely, coat them lightly with petroleum jelly. Dust the coils with a special long, flexible brush or use the vacuum cleaner brush attachment designed for the job.

You might smell like a pickle when you're done, but you'll know that everything is really clean.

George C. Clark

After earning a BFA degree from the School of the Art Institute I began a long career in commercial art in the *Mad Men* days of the 1960s. It was interrupted by 13 months in combat at a 130-man heavy artillery base up near the Cambodian border in Vietnam.

Once back in the real world I continued my career. I did graphics and TV storyboards for national advertising accounts, designed and illustrated child-oriented hobbycraft kits for a major manufacturer, illustrated textbooks for education publishers, and for 12 years mostly in the 1990s created cartoon puzzles, mazes, and paper sculpture projects that ran on the "Spots" page of the *Chicago Tribune* Sunday color comics.


I also began a parallel career in fine arts. My first one-person gallery show was held in 1978. Since then my figure paintings, landscapes, and graphics have been exhibited at many museums—the Art Institute of Chicago and the Art Museums of Milwaukee, Rockford, and Fort Wayne, among others-and commercial and institutional galleries. My work has been acquired by the collections of the Illinois State Museums, the United States Air Force, the National Veterans Art Museum, the Kinsey Institute, McDonald's Corporation, the Quaker Oats Company, Sandoz/ Novartis AG, the Ritz Carlton Hotel of Cleveland, and many other corporate and private collections. Most of these are in the Midwest, but my work is also in collections in California, Texas, New York, Israel, Japan, and England.

I retired from doing commercial art years ago and now I just create the art I love to make. Drawing and painting from life has always been at the core of my art, whether working with models in the studio or doing on-site drawings or watercolors of interesting places and things I have encountered on my travels.


My series called "Traveler's Sketchbook" includes subjects that range from my own back yard to the back roads of Europe, and can be seen online at travelerssketchbook.blogspot.com. The highest-profile recent exhibition of my figure work was at the Chicago Cultural Center downtown in the winter of 2017. More than fifty paintings and drawings were shown in a show titled "Portraits Real and Imaginary." My wife Pat and I moved into our Independence Park house in August 1986, and we love this neighborhood. The prior owners had converted it into a two-flat, which was perfect for us as I could use the upstairs as my cluttered art studio, leaving the first floor as our main living space and satisfying Pat's desire for tidy surroundings.


